CENTRAL PROVINCE TEAMS UP WITH MCGREAL CENTER TO HOUSE ARCHIVES

At the Provincial Council this past October, Archivist Jill O'Brien reported to the Council about a new partnership with the Mary Nona McGreal Center for Dominican Historical Studies, located at Dominican University in River Forest, IL.

Our partnership allows us to begin collecting a larger share of our historical record, and to preserve that imprint for generations to come. Perhaps Lay Dominicans of the 22nd century will wonder how we operated at the beginning of the 21st. We certainly are fascinated by the scarce jewels we have received from previous generations. Formation, reading lists, correspondences, and on and on.

And so with generosity to our ancestors who built up this Lay Dominican Family, and with hope that we might be helpful to our brothers and sisters yet unborn, the Central Province Lay Dominicans will begin creating, collecting, and preserving all historical documents that might show a little about who we were, what we did, and why we did it.

Such an effort doesn't work if only a few Lay Dominicans of the Province decide to get involved. This is a Province-wide endeavor to preserve our heritage. There was a strong consensus at the Provincial Council among all present delegates that efforts would be made at the chapter and individual levels to join this initiative.

CENTRAL PROVINCE TO BEGIN "LAY DOMINICAN ORAL HISTORY PROJECT"

"The Lay Dominican Oral History Project" (LDOH) is a great way to lay the groundwork for the new Archives at the McGreal Center. This project is like taking a snapshot of hundreds of Lay Dominicans right now, in 2013, and a fun way to get our Archives started in the right direction!

The Project consists of a series of interviews with contemporary Lay Dominicans, including you! That interview may take place on camera, voice recording, scripted out, or even done by yourself in the privacy of your own home.

The long series of questions is structured to get you thinking about what Dominican life has meant to you personally. The first questions are about you and your

family, where you come from, to get a firm foundation for each participant. Then the interview progresses into directed questions specifically relating to life as a Lay Dominican in 2013.

Each chapter is urged to select one member to become the organizer and orchestrator of the LDOH within their chapter, scheduling and leading interviews. With a champion of the LDOH in each chapter, we are assured of swift progress and ultimate success in creating a strong footprint of who we are for future generations.

Some example questions from the interview:

- 8. What attracted you to the Order and how did you discover your call to be a Lay Dominican? How old were you when you joined? In what year did you join?
- 15. How have you grown and changed through affiliation with the Lay Dominicans? How have the elements of Dominican practice (prayer, study, community, and ministry) influenced you, others, and your spiritual life?
- 18. What would you want to share with future Lay Dominicans about your experience as a member?

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE, WINTER 2013

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

As we once again go through the Lenten season, most of spend some time more specifically reflecting on our lives: striving to change ourselves during this season and praying with renewed energy for forgiveness for the past and help for the future.

I would like to make a proposal to all our groups and chapters that we do this not only individually, but communally during this year of Faith. This is neither original nor unique. It was proposed to us in the past and I think it is now a good time in our history to reemphasize it. We emphasize the four-fold basis if our our life, commonly known as the pillars: prayer, study, community and mission/apostolate/preaching. This proposal has to do with the latter two.

My proposal is not a complicated one, but perhaps a difficult one. It grows out of my observation that most of us have, over the last few decades, seen a real growth in our understanding and practice of study and liturgical and devotional prayer in our groups and in our province. I think it would be good for us now to more specifically examine ourselves in our understanding and living out of community and mission.

We called to mission by basic our constitutions: (Apostolic Mission) They follow the example of Saint Dominic, Saint Catherine of Siena and our forbears who illumined the life of the Order and the Church, and strengthened by their fraternal communion, bear witness above all to their own faith, listen to the needs of their contemporaries, and serve the truth. They pay careful attention to the principal goals of the church's present-day apostolate, driven in a special way to show real compassion to all who are troubled, to defend liberty and to promote justice and peace. Inspired by the charism of the Order, they are mindful that apostolic activity comes out of an abundance of contemplation. (http://frat.op.org/)

My proposal is that we spend some time during this Lenten season or plan to spend some some time during this year in some serious communal selfexamination of where we are in terms of 'corporate' identity and purpose. I think starting with an examination of our indiviual identity and purpose in the context of our Dominican life is a comfortable place for most of us. We have a good idea of what we consider our 'preaching' to be. The question is, "How does this or how can this fit into a vision of mission or preaching for our group or chapter?" Many of us spend some time in sharing our vision. Perhaps it's time to move past this level and to develop some commonality of vision. Some have already done this in notable ways and could perhaps share their process and success with the rest of us.

How do we 'bear witness' as individual communities and as a province? We have a provincial mission statement. Do we strive to live up to it? Does my group/chapter have a mission statement? Do we each have a rationale for existence? We are the members of the Order best positioned for reaching out into the community. Do we spend much energy and and planning on how to do this? Are we just internally focused by default? Are we examples of unity and understanding in our own gatherings?


My own chapter, at my suggestion, is having a day of 'active contemplation' to examine some of these questions – a sort of communal examination of conscience. We hope we can achieve a better understanding of each other and how our individual visions can somehow fuse into a common vision of how we can better become a communal witness to and sharer of the Word. I strongly encourage all to work on these two aspects of our life during the year. We take time to plan and discuss our common prayer and study. CALL FOR CHALLENGE DISTRIBUTION MANAGER!



If you are on a fixed income, please pay what you can. Even paying \$5 for the *Challenge* newsletter subscription is helpful.


