

St. Paul did not have or use electronics, but still his words are electrifying, stirring us to more faithful service. In addressing the community of believers in Rome, where he had not yet visited, St. Paul reminds them "that the footsteps of those who bring good news is a welcome sound, ... so faith comes from what is preached (Romans 10:15, 17). electronic system wears out, or continually malfunctions, what can be done? Thankfully, with the help of the grant from the Las Casas Board, we were able to enrich our hearing, and have added options so the celebrant at Mass could be heard also, at the altar, or with a hand microphone apart from the pulpit. The grant was a wonderful help in completing the purchase of a new sound system for Seven Dolors Church, in Fort Totten, and for a portable system at one of our missions, Christ the King, Tokio, all on the Spirit Lake Dakotah Reservation, east central North Dakota, in the Fargo Diocese.

Over the course of the last twenty years, the previous system served, and at times faltered. Due to its design and construction, replacement parts were no longer available, since developments have moved to digital and other forms of remote and distance connections. No

accurate records are available as to when the previous system was installed. But when taking the console to electronic shops in hopes of repairs, the look of amazement was continuing evidence that accompanied the words: "they don't make that stuff anymore." So we are most grateful to have been able to replace our audio system, and let what is preached be heard clearly. There are still members of our parish family that do not read. One such person comes from a considerable distance, just off the Reservation, "because I can hear, even from the fourth pew." So it is a great joy to know that benefits of a good sound system, make possible the growth in faith and service that St. Paul commends, in times when we take for granted that everyone can read, write, and communicate without any difficulty.

To each of you who have been so generous and supportive of Las Casas and its ministries over the years, we express our sincere thanks, and appreciation for your help in allowing us to improve our sound system, provide a new one for one of our missions, and allow for the enrichment of lives, each day, each week, through the ministry of the Word—written, spoken, and enfleshed in Jesus Christ, whose love and instruction for right living is shared.


Project Learning

Fort Belknap is a relatively small Indian reservation located in north central Montana and is home to the Gros Ventre and Assiniboine Tribes. Located in the southern corner of Fort Belknap is Mission Grade School in the small town of Hays. Systemic change is a long-term project that requires, first and foremost, a good education. If children can exposed to a positive educational environment – one that touches mind, body, and soul – then we believe that doors can be opened and new paths made available. The entire staff at Mission Grade School is deeply committed to this ideal and we strive each day to give our children the opportunities they deserve. We see the importance of educating the whole child – mind, body, and cultural spirit. We challenge young minds, we celebrate our Catholic faith, and we embrace the Native American culture.

Last year, with the help of Las Casas, we initiated Project Learning. We saw the need to expose our students to some of the numerous opportunities that exist beyond the boundaries of Fort Belknap Reservation. Part of our project included a three day field trip to Bozeman, Montana with our fifth and sixth grade students. The children visited the Museum of the Rockies, attended a program at the Taylor Planetarium, and experimented with "dry ice" and "simple machines" at the It was a wonderful Children's Museum. experience for all. I believe our students were convinced that learning can be exciting.

We want our children to be able to break many of the negative cycles that often develop on our reservations. Hopefully, in the future, they will have the freedom, knowledge, values and skills to make good choices and to grow to their fullest potential.



Navajo Mission and Ministry in Chinle, AZ


Due to the remoteness of Chinle and its surrounding areas, other than school and sports, there is not much opportunity for the majority of our children to go beyond the border towns for wider experiences. Our volunteers and I try to provide Church experiences for the children outside their cultural/traditional ceremonies and integrate them into their life experiences. RCIA and Religious Education classes do this to some extent, but our teens are left somewhat in a vacuum. So we started a Youth Group for inter-faith teens...5th grade through high school...basically "Circle Sharing, Food, and Fun." The high school students wear two hats...group and team since they do not wish to leave the group after 8th grade.



This past spring we wanted to take our teens out of their home environment and provide a retreat atmosphere for three days at the Sacred Heart Retreat Center outside of Gallup in a beautiful Mesa-Desert area. We had difficulty raising the money to do so since we do not have cash flow for such projects. We were also pleased with the Las Casas Grant response. It helped us tremendously to meet our dream.

After much planning and teaming, 16 youth and a team of 7 took off for Sacred Heart Retreat Center southeast of Gallup. Excitement

was high. We took our own food and served one another with meals, chores, preparations, and clean-up. This not only cut costs drastically, but helped form community in the process. Ringing of the large out-door bell for gathering was one of the exciting points of interest and novelty for our youth.



The focus of the Retreat was "You are called, You are Chosen...Our Future Navajo Nation." Each team gave presentations according to their own charism and life experiences. Each morning was a walk to the East to welcome Creator God and blessings for a new day and at night a walk to the West in total gratitude for the blessings of the day and restful sleep. Interspersed throughout the retreat was laughter, games, sharing, food, fun and dialogue individually with team members. Overall we had a great weekend. expressed the time went by way too quickly and would like to go again for more days in the future.

We'd like to express our gratitude for responding over and above our expectations in regards to the support and monies you have given to us. We want you to know it helped us to fulfill our expectations

Casa's New Look

Through the generosity of Las Casas, a Sinsinawa Dominican ministry with Native Americans, Casa San Jose received \$1500 to purchase a storage shed. This new look has allowed the teen mothers to assist with storing many items that are donated for the spring and fall yard sales. These sales are the primary income for recreation and social events for the teen moms and their children.

The majority of the residents for Casa San Jose in New Mexico are Native Americans from across New Mexico and Northern Arizona. In the last year, Casa has had Native Americans from the Zuni, Acoma, Apache, and Navajo Tribes. Casa San Jose is an agency of Catholic Charities of Gallup and has been in existence for 33 years. It is a group home for pregnant and parenting teens, as well as transitional living apartments for the older teens who will be living independently upon discharge.

Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa

Far up in the woods in the northwest corner of Wisconsin is the Red Cliff Indian Reservation. We are the northern point of the Bayfield Peninsula reaching out into Lake Superior. It truly is one of the places that can be called "God's Country." The beauty of the people and the surroundings resound God's presence in every child's laugh, ripple of water, and seedling reaching to grow.

St. Francis Catholic Church in Red Cliff, like many reservation churches, struggles to keep their church going. Without the grants, donations, fund raisers and the endless hours of volunteers who help out in so many different ways, St. Francis would struggle even more.

Our Church Hall (the basement below our Church) has its walls and ceiling filled with 15 murals and many more paintings. Rita Vander

Venter, a Chippewa artist, painted these murals in the off seasons during the winters of 2002 and 2003. Two of the images: a painting of a stained glass window of the Holy Spirit and the Ascension of Jesus were the two images that were chosen to be placed on t-shirts. The t-shirts are now being sold as a fund raiser.



We are grateful for the Las Casas grant that was the seed money to "double" the profits for the church. Light blue, light yellow and ash t-shirts help the images stand out in their beauty, in their proclamation of Catholic images, and as a part of St. Francis Church.

Barb has been the Pastoral Minister for the St. Francis Church and four other parishes in the Bayfield Cluster for the past three years.
