Dear Friend of Las Casas:

fter a year, which has provided glaring evidence of racial inequities, some federal funds have been designated to begin to address a more equitable treatment of the Native/ Indigenous People after centuries of treaty violations by the federal government. The aid comes after a year that devastated Native/Indigenous people across the country, as poverty, multigenerational housing, and underlying health conditions contributed to the deadly spread of the pandemic.

Despite the challenges of COVID-19, tribal leaders closed reservations and secured vaccines not only for their people but the areas surrounding the reservations, which are oftentimes very remote. As one tribal leader noted: "Indian tribes are fully invested in our communities, we do not move away and our investments are here to stay".

The media these days carry stories of unmarked graves of children from boarding schools that were run by various religious groups and under-funded by the federal government. As we have experienced during the recent pandemic, diseases spread rapidly in close living quarters and over the last century there have been many epidemics affecting children, which were deadly. Please pray for the Native/Indigenous families involved with these recent tragic discoveries.

Thanks to the generosity of the Dominican Sisters, Friars and other generous donors, Las Casas has sent funds in January and May 2021 to all Dominicans who minister with Native/Indigenous people. The Board has received gracious notes identifying how the funds have met a vast array of needs. As you review the responses, it will give you pause but at the same time you will note how your support of Las Casas over the years has made a difference in the lives of so many. Your generous donations have helped us serve the most vulnerable in so many ways: food boxes, hay for livestock, water, gloves, hygiene items, gas for hard-hit families, stocking items in a thrift shop, a freezer for meat given from the hunting season for those in need, funeral expenses... and the list of basics continues...

Our deepest thanks for your financial, prayerful, and moral support.

Native Voices · Native Land

II of us live on Native land. In the Ecological Programming at Sinsinawa Mound, we begin our events with these words. It is important that we go beyond these simple words, however, and understand whose land we are on.

Our Indigenous-led webinars – supported by a generous Las Casas grant and featuring Ho-Chunk, Ioway, and Lakota speakers – have been important for understanding whose land we're on: that Native communities are still here, still working toward the wellness of the land and people.

Too often it is white voices who speak for Native Americans. These webinars helped to change that. After Bill Quackenbush's presentation on the Ho-Chunk (which 100+ participated in) two separate white-led, historical organizations contacted us to thank us for the program and said that they would use Bill's words to train their staff as well to teach non-Native people the proper history of Native presence in this region.

But we must not only consider Indigenous history as if Native culture is something of the past. Crucially, Lance Foster (Ioway) and Maka Black Elk (Lakota) talked about Indigenous futures – paths towards resurgence and healing. The Ioway, for example, are in the midst of creating a National Park on their reservation land in Kansas. And Maka Black Elk, along with his Lakota people, are actively creating a future of healing from the trauma of boarding schools and pointing towards what a post-colonial Indigenous Catholicism might look like.

We must continue listening to these voices for they point us out of our manifold ecological and spiritual crises. Thank you, Las Casas, for supporting this important work!



he presence of a sister on the Flathead Reservation in Montana is greatly appreciated by the Salish and Kootenai people and the parish where I minister. I guide scripture study. Those who gather learn from professional scripture scholars on videos purchased through a Las Casas grant. They appreciate the quality of the presentations and my presence with them. I often indicate to them that any one of them could lead the group, their reply is something like, "But you know about scriptures and we greatly appreciate your guidance." Their affirmation means a lot to me and encourages me to continue ministry with them.

A special ministry experience is preparing a child for First Communion. The family is from the Crow reservation. The mother is studying in the nursing program at the Salish and Kootenai College on the reservation. This college developed by a Salish man is designed especially for Native students. When this mother asked me to prepare her son for First Communion, we met in a room where social distancing was possible. As the classes progressed, I became more impressed with the deep faith and understanding expressed by the mother and grandmother. They told me they had received Catholic education from schools established by religious communities on their Crow reservation. For me this was an example of the rich contribution that religious communities have made over the years to Native People.

Thanks, Las Casas, for your support of this meaningful ministry.



Dominicans in Ministry with Native/Indigenous People

rdinarily the Las Casas Board accepts applications for grants and scholarships each year from Dominicans ministering with Native/Indigenous People. However, as we all know, these are not ordinary times. Several years ago the Las Casas board members made the decision to be in direct contact with each Dominican in ministry with Native People. This has helped bridge communications, respond to immediate needs and fulfill the mission of Las Casas.

This year, the Las Casas board suspended receiving any grant requests and have been in conversation with Dominicans throughout the country. Funds were given to all in the ministry, (see letter from Nathalie Meyer, OP, president) since during these challenging times, their focus is on being present with the people and responding to critical needs amidst the numerous and ongoing challenges of the Covid pandemic.

This past year, it has been reported by numerous news agencies that Native communities have seen the highest rate of Corona Virus cases, hospitalizations and deaths of any racial or ethnic group in the U.S. They have suffered disproportionally during the Pandemic and exposed the racial divides and inequities in our country. Jonathan Nez, President of the Navajo Nation, reported that "30-40% of Navajo people don't even have running water in the most powerful country in the world."

Despite it all, Native/Indigenous People are resilient and Dominicans walk with them. Noted below are some of their comments amidst the challenges of the Covid-19 pandemic...

riving a vehicle to visit elders in their homes on roads along hillsides and up into mountainous areas can be a challenge. Finally arriving, it is a joy to knock on the door of an elder and see a big smile on the face of the person opening the door. This welcome makes the drive worthwhile.

After sharing conversation, reading of the Sunday gospel, prayer and receiving Eucharist, the person usually responds, "I feel so much better. Thank you for coming."

Mrs. Betty, one of the elders I visit, age 96, lives alone without a caretaker. Each day she drives her truck down the lane to pick up her mail, feed the horses, bring water to the calves, and care for five guinea hens. Betty talks to them and they have become her friends. When a fox lurks around, Mrs. Betty pulls out her shot gun and shoots a few rounds in the air scaring the fox from her property and secures the safety of her four and two legged friends.

After visiting elders, one could describe Indigenous women as brave, spirit-filled and resilient. They are natural caretakers of earth. As a way of life, they continually reflect on the wonders of creation, animals, water, vegetation and nurturing children. Women are deeply respected and honored. They teach the younger generation their native language, tribal traditions and cultural values. For some women in the Native community, when the end is near, they firmly believe, the mountains are calling. They respond, "I must go."
